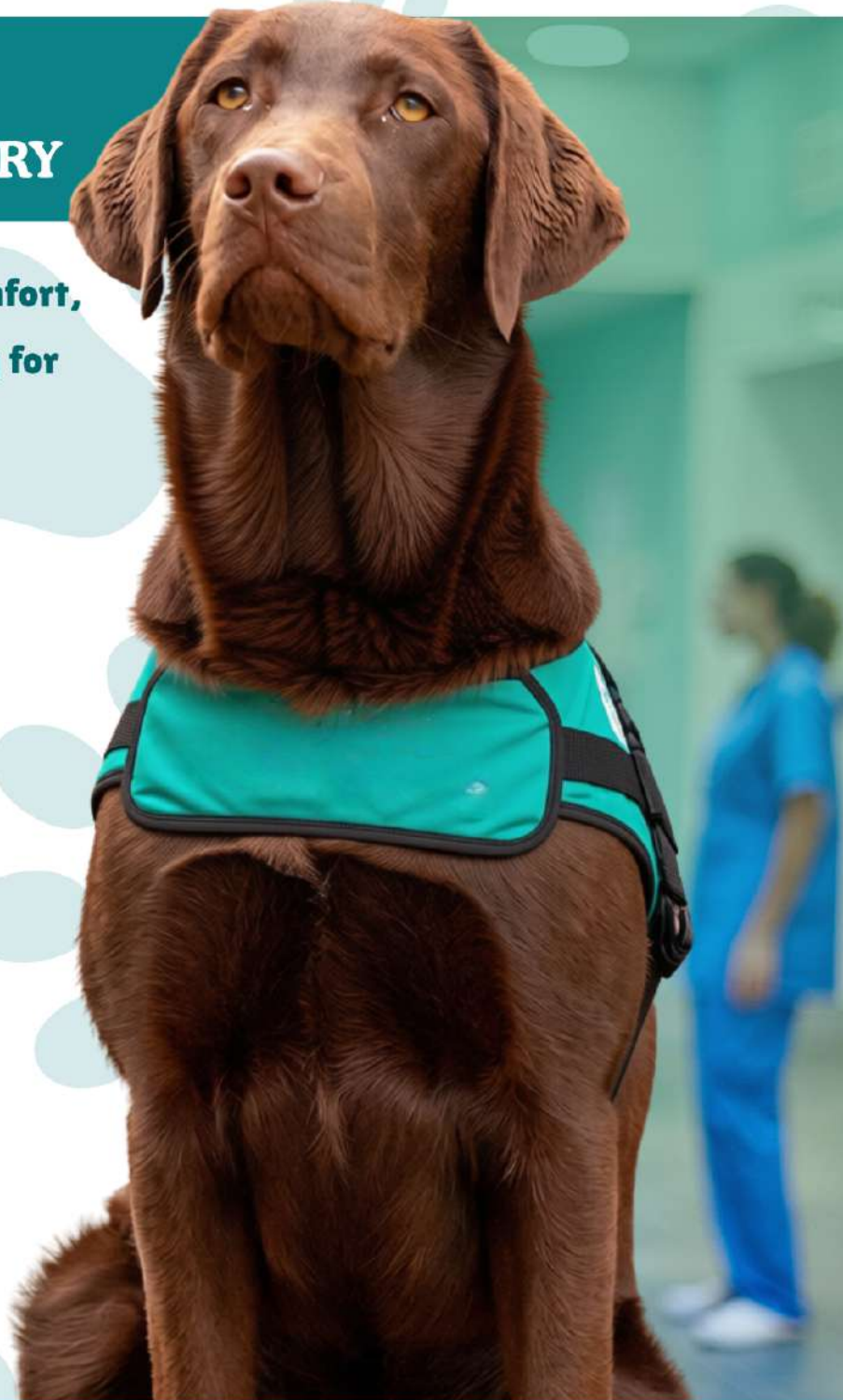

A Facility Dog for Your Hospital

A facility dog is a fully trained, professionally handled dog assigned to your facility. The dog works with a designated handler to support patients through treatment and recovery, steady families through hard conversations, and give staff relief on the days that need it.

WHAT THE DOG DOES AT YOUR DEPARTMENT

- Patient support during treatment, procedures, and recovery, including pediatric and oncology units
- Presence in emergency departments, waiting rooms, and family consultation rooms
- Support for families during difficult conversations, end-of-life care, and bereavement
- Motivation during rehabilitation and physical therapy sessions
- Staff wellness for nursing units, ICU, and emergency teams after critical incidents
- Memory care, behavioral health, and long-term care visits

HOW THE PROGRAM WORKS

- 1 Consultation:** This may include phone and/or Zoom consultations, as well as in-person evaluations with the puppy or dog being considered for the program. Our goal is to determine whether the dog is a good fit for the department, handler, and intended working environment. If a dog has not yet been selected, All Stage can also help guide your department through the process of finding an appropriate candidate.
- 2 Training:** The assigned handler will house and care for the department dog and work alongside our trainers throughout the training process. This program is designed to train both ends of the leash—the handler's education, confidence, and ability to work with the dog are just as important as the dog's training.
- 3 Certification:** Training includes preparation for the **AKC Canine Good Citizen (CGC)**, **Community Canine (Advanced CGC)**, and **Urban CGC**, along with **Therapy Plus TADS** Specialized Therapy Certification. The team will also complete public-access and specialized training in the real-world environments where the dog will actually work, such as offices, courtrooms, interview rooms, schools, hospitals, community events, or other department-specific settings.

Most departments assign the dog to a peer support member, CISM team member, or public education officer.

TYPICAL TIMELINE

- ~6 months → Dog is actively working inside the department
- ~10 months → Dog is working in public settings
- ~9 months to 2 years → Full program, depending on the dog and the job

Training continues until the dog reaches two years of age, and as needed after that for the life of the dog's service.

ONE-TIME TRAINING INVESTMENT

Covers the dog's entire working career with your department. Every training format below, ongoing support for as long as the dog serves, new job assignments as your needs change, and full transition training when a new handler takes over. One active handler at a time. An additional or replacement dog is a separate program.

The dog is separate. Your department obtains and owns the dog. Cost varies widely by source, from a shelter placement to a purpose-bred prospect. We can help you find and assess candidates before you commit.
